FEEDBACK ON GREEN SQUARE EVENT

The club was pleased to be asked by Himali Wettasinghe from the City of Sydney to participate in the Green Square Neighbour Fest on the 25th of June. The aim of the event is to promote interaction in the Green Square community and promote Council resources and interest groups that could appeal to local residents. The Council can see that bonsai is an activity and craft that is highly compatible with unit living and those with limited garden space.

The club was allocated a tent in Matron Ruby Grant Park. We shared the park with a stage demonstrating Latin American Music, Piecemakers Eastern Suburbs Quilters and a dumpling stand offering vegan, vegetarian, seafood and meat options.

We had a number of trees on display. From left to right:- David's dwarf umbrella tree, an Azalea planned as a demo on tidying up a very overgrown tree, Chris' mini and medium Port Jackson figs, Brian's tanuki Juniper, David's Premna, Bryan's multi-trunk Olive and his Easter Show prize-winning Leptospermum, and Chris' "flat-top" Baeckea.

All the tree's attracted attention. It was a close call on the crowd favourite but I think Chris' Beackea just pipped Bryan's Leptospermum.

It is testament to many peoples unhappy first experience with bonsai that they were encouraged that the Premna was deciduous and alive.

The Council had advertised the event through the Unit complexes and the Council's website. Most people who came to the stall had seen the Council ads and were coming to see us.



The event itself was not frantically busy but we did get a reasonable number of visitors all of whom were very interested in Bonsai. Most lived in the area and most owned "bonsais" of some description.

We didn't have a sufficient crowd to do the demonstration, however I did show a few people how one goes about trimming an Azalea and was able to talk about style and growth habits.

One of our visitors had come all the way from Norway to talk about Bonsai. Through the power of the internet I was able to show her the details of a bonsai specialist

outlet in Norway so there may be another enthusiast in the making.

Overall it was a good event and we are hoping we will see some of our visitors at the club.

We look forward to participating in more Council sponsored events and spreading the word about bonsai through the Green Square community.



The Canberra Bonsai Society is making their Newsletter available to other clubs. We have received an electronic copy. It is worth a read. From their correspondence it seems they "Zoom" their meetings and the links for the June meeting are provided (too late for that) – not sure if you can just crash in on any of their meetings but they had no hesitation sending us the Zoom details for June meeting. May be worth a look, so get in touch via the Club e-mail if you want the details.

THINGS TO DO THIS MONTH by John July

1. Ideally most of your trees should be re-potted prior to bud swell. However, if you have many deciduous trees to be re-potted you may want to start re-potting some in July. Species that could be considered for early re-potting are; Mulberry, Chinese Elm, Japanese Flowering Cherry, Japanese Flowering Apricot, Japanese Flowering Quince, Chinese Quince, Pomegranate and pears.
2. Heavy prune and trunk chop deciduous and evergreen trees while dormant (except [Japanese Maples](#) and [Pines](#). Energy stored in the roots will help accelerate the new growth in Spring).
3. All species of trees can be wired at this time so that it can be left on as long as possible while the tree is dormant.
4. Take the time to collect sufficient materials now for repotting when needed.
5. Any deciduous trees that you have in the ground can be dug up, root pruned and return to the ground for further growth. Alternatively if they have developed sufficiently they can be potted. (leave evergreens until early Spring)
6. Pines and evergreens can be grafted now.
7. Melaleuca cuttings can be taken now off half-ripe lateral shoots.
8. Root prune and repot cedars.
9. Spray trees that are prone to mildew (eg maples, crepe murtles, oaks, roses and olives) with lime-sulphur solution two or three times during Winter.



10. During re potting work you may have the misfortune to find Curl Grubs in some of your pots. For those of you who are not familiar with this destructive pest they have a white body an orange brown head and strong mouth parts and usually rest in a "U" shape. They chew on the tree's root system robbing it of its fibrous roots. The best prevention of major damage is early detection. Detection can be made by noticing a lack of growth on your tree or inconsistent growth, die back on the tips of branches, loose unstable trunks or if you push your finger through the soil surface and it moves down too easily. Unfortunately a lot of the time you only realise when you sight them during re potting of a tree. When you do find them remove every single one of them large or small. They can get wedged tightly right up into root systems so you may have to shake all the soil out to get them all.

If you suspect that some may be in your tree but it is not the right season for re potting I would suggest you try and drown them in a weak solution of Condyl's Crystals. Totally submerge your tree for a day or two and some will crawl out of the pot and others will just drown in the root system.

After re potting a dose of Seasol will help the root system get back into full swing at a much faster rate as well.
