MONTHLY MEETING FEEDBACK JUNE

The June meeting was again very well attended with a mix of established members and an expanding group of new members. .

The meeting itself was again preceded by a beginners class which kicked off at 6.00pm. The class, which addressed re-potting issues,

was led by John.

At the meeting proper, Bryan welcomed new and established members and introduced Rod Donegon (representative of Hyper Grow and Ausperl) who then proceeded to share his extensive knowledge of materials commonly found in Bonsai mixes.

Rod demonstrated a comprehensive knowledge of materials such as vermiculite, pumices etc., and their interaction with plant health. He also addressed the components of fertilizers and their ideal proportions and how they affect the growth and well-being of plants, with special emphasis on bonsai. Rod's advice was well received and prompted good formal and informal discussion after the body of the presentation.









The formal agenda pretty well occupied all the available time but there was some left for people to inspect the trees that were brought in. Choosing cascades as a topic was always a risky proposition as some members do not have examples to show and transporting cascades is always fraught with the risk of damage (or worse). Neverthe-less a few examples were tabled and they were complemented by a number of nice non-cascade trees and a good show on the Swap Table.

HOME VISIT

Neville made the kind offer to have people around to his residence, to have a look at his Bonsai collection. More than a dozen people were able to take up the offer. They were

rewarded with great weather and an equally great display. Neville's trees were in fine form and demonstrated that native species make really impressive bonsais. (As an aside, at this time of year, cast an eye over the SALE racks at "Flower Power". There are some good examples of Australian natives, and other species, currently available at very good prices. They may be looking a bit sad due to less-than-optimal care and seasonal factors but they are great value).





Neville and James have also got a good grasp of the technique of using styrene foam and tinted fibreglass resin to make lightweight feature rocks and pots. There were a number of examples in use, ready to go and under construction. We may get lucky and have a demonstration of their techniques at a Club meeting in the future.

While in Neville's shed a collection of pots from local potters was revealed. Neatly stacked away, these pots were patiently waiting to be matched to just the right tree. The symbiosis between pots and trees was a recurring feature of Neville's collection. Pots from specialised bonsai potters may not be the cheapest option but they are likely to have the greatest impact. And, with proper handling, they are good for a lifetime.

James' arm may also be twisted to have a similar "Open day" at his residence so keep your ears open for an announcement, hopefully in the not-to-distant future.

Development Of A Japanese Maple From The Matsudaira Shohin Bonsai Collection

I obtained this shohin Japanese bonsai from the Matsudaira Shohin Bonsai Collection in February 1985, but could not afford the unglazed round shallow container. This bonsai has been turned around several times in its 128 years of training. I was acting as a "curator" trying to maintain the original design when purchased. In 2005 I decided to change the design and added several branches by inarch grafting. As can be noticed my new design is very similar to the original design by the Matsudairas as seen in 1973. It was displayed in the 1957 and 1974 Kokufu Bonsai Exhibitions.

The latest Bonsai Society of Sydney newsletter has an article re spraying Lime Sulphur during winter and a notice of their exhibition on 19th August at Forestville.

THINGS TO DO THIS MONTH by John JULY

- 1. Take the time to collect sufficient materials now for re-potting.
- 2. Conifers, deciduous and flowering trees can be re-potted now. Ideally most of your deciduous trees should be re-potted prior to bud swell which will normally occur around late July and August in Sydney, but if you have a lot of trees to be re-potted you may want to start re-potting some in early July. Species that could be considered for early re-potting are; Mulberry, Chinese Elm, Japanese Flowering Cherry, Japanese Flowering Apricot, Japanese Flowering Quince, Chinese Quince, Pomegranate and Pears.
- 3. Heavy prune and trunk chop deciduous and evergreen trees while dormant (except <u>Japanese Maples</u> and <u>Pines</u>). Energy stored in the roots will help accelerate the new growth in Spring.
- 4. All species of trees can be wired at this time so that it can be left on as long as possible while the tree is dormant.
- 5. Any deciduous trees that you have in the ground can be dug up, root pruned and return to the ground for further growth. Alternatively if they have developed sufficiently they can be potted. (leave evergreens until early Spring)
- 6. Pines and evergreens can be grafted now.
- 7. Melaleuca cuttings can be taken now off half-ripe lateral shoots.
- 8. Repot and root prune cedars.
- 9. Spray trees that are prone to mildew (eg maples, crepe myrtles, oaks, roses and olives) with lime-sulphur solution two or three times during Winter. However it doesn't hurt to spray all deciduous trees. Cover the soil of the pot with hand towel or newspaper to prevent the lime-sulphur from soaking into the soil and damaging roots. Spray on a clear day with no wind and make sure you spray all parts of trunk, branches and top and bottom of leaves. Wear gloves and mask and avoid overspray which can stain or bleach. Its also a good time to clean and paint Jins and Sharis with lime sulphur.
- 10. During re potting work keep an eye out for Curl Grubs. These destructive pests have a white body an orange brown head and strong mouth parts and usually rest in a "U" shape. They eat the tree's fibrous



root and if not detected and removed can kill a tree. The best prevention is early detection. If you do find them remove every single one of them large or small. They can get wedged tightly right up into root systems so you may have to shake all the soil out to get them all.


If you suspect that some may be in your tree but it is not the right season for re potting try immersing them in a weak solution of Condi's Crystals for a day or two. Some will crawl out of the pot and others will just drown in the root system.


- 11. After re potting a dose of Seasol will help the root system get back into full swing at a much faster rate as well.
- 12. Keep trees in the Sun during Winter if possible. Particularly trees that you may have had in the shade during summer such as Acers (Maples). This will also help to avoid root rot.
- 13. Give benches a good scrub to remove the build-up of gunk. Use a very dilute solution of bleach to help kill unwanted larvae and spores.
- 14. Avoid feeding your bonsai Nitrogen based fertiliser, particularly for deciduous trees. Look for the nutrient analysis to confirm the NPK ratio to determine if you are using a fertiliser or a soil conditioner. Seasol® and GOGO® Juice and other soil conditioners are fine to give to trees during the winter period and it is safe to apply these products after repotting.

Min/Max BOM temperature forecasts (Observatory Hill) for the upcoming months including 14 day rolling average, provided by David follow:-






Also of interest is the Year-To-Date rainfall. As you no doubt know we have had an unseasonably dry June so keep an eye on your watering regime.
